4	JUDGE WEINSCHENK: All right. Good afternoon
5	everyone. This is an oral hearing for IPR2017-01976 and
6	01977.
7	Let's start with appearances, and when you introduce
8	yourself, please step up to the center podium.
9	Who do you have here for petitioner?
10	MR. CAMACHO: Your Honor, this is Jesse Camacho, and
11	a colleague, Christine Guastello.
12	JUDGE WEINSCHENK: All right. Thank you,
13	Mr. Camacho.
14	MS. GUSKE: For patent owner is Sarah Guske and
15	Wayne Stacy. And also from Twilio, Robert McHenry.
16	JUDGE WEINSCHENK: All right. Thank you,
17	Ms. Guske.
18	As you may or may not know, usually when the first
19	snowflake hits the ground here in D.C., the city shuts down,
20	so we certainly appreciate you all braving the elements and
21	making it here today.
22	We'll start with a few preliminary matters. As you
23	can see, Judges McGraw and Judge Moore are appearing
24	remotely, so in order for them to hear you, please step up

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1	to the center podium when you are speaking. And if you are
2	using demonstratives, please refer to slide numbers so they
3	can follow along.
4	Secondly, in our order we gave each side 60 minutes
5	to present their case for both of these cases. After
6	looking over the issues, I think we actually may need a
7	little bit more time to get through everything here today,
8	so if we go a little bit longer, I'll make sure both sides
9	get equal amounts of time.
10	But with that, is there any time constraints we have
11	here from either side in terms of travel after the hearing?
12	MR. CAMACHO: Petitioner has a 4:45 flight.
13	JUDGE WEINSCHENK: Okay. What time would you need
14	to be done here, would you say?
15	MR. CAMACHO: I would say 3:20, 3:30.
16	JUDGE WEINSCHENK: Okay.
17	MR. CAMACHO: But if we have to push that, that's

19	JUDGE WEINSCHENK: Okay. All right. Ms. Guske,
20	any time restraints on your end?
21	MS. GUSKE: Not for patent owner, no.
22	JUDGE WEINSCHENK: All right. And then the last
23	issue is, I know we have some information that was filed
24	under seal in these cases. As of right now, this hearing is

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1	open to the public. The transcript will be public. I think
2	it would be my preference to keep it that way, so if we can
3	sort of refer to information at a high enough level, I think
4	that would great for us.
5	If we do reach a situation where you think you need
6	to refer to some confidential information, please stop me and
7	let us know, and we can make sure that that designation gets
8	in the transcript. Okay?
9	All right. Well, with that, let's start with
10	petitioner, Mr. Camacho.
