Registration Refused - Section 2(d) Likelihood of Confusion

Registration of the applied-for mark is refused because of a likelihood of confusion with the mark in U.S. Registration No. 5600187. Trademark Act Section 2(d), 15 U.S.C. §1052(d); see TMEP §§1207.01 et seq. See the attached registration ("Exhibit A").

The applicant GusHill Industries LLC has applied for the mark "GUSHILL USA" in standard characters for "Tow bars for trailers; Tow bars for vehicles; Aeroplanes towing vehicles; Metal locking device for trailer hitch couplers; Steps for attachment to trailer hitches; Trailer hitch ball covers; Trailer hitch covers; Trailer hitches; Vehicle tow bar connector covers; Vehicle tow bars" in International Class 12.

The registrant Liminal Industries, Inc., owns the registered mark "GUSHILL" in standard characters for "Metal locking device for trailer hitch couplers" in International Class 12.

In this case, the following factors are the most relevant: similarity of the marks, similarity and nature of the goods, and similarity of the trade channels of the goods. *See In re Viterra Inc.*, 671 F.3d 1358, 1361-62, 101 USPQ2d 1905, 1908 (Fed. Cir. 2012); TMEP §§1207.01 et seq.

Comparison of Marks

Marks are compared in their entireties for similarities in appearance, sound, connotation, and commercial impression. *Stone Lion Capital Partners, LP v. Lion Capital LLP*, 746 F.3d 1317, 1321, 110 USPQ2d 1157, 1160 (Fed. Cir. 2014); TMEP §1207.01(b)-(b)(v). "Similarity in any one of these elements may be sufficient to find the marks confusingly similar." *In re Inn at St. John's, LLC*, 126 USPQ2d 1742, 1746 (TTAB 2018) (citing *In re Davia*, 110 USPQ2d 1810, 1812 (TTAB 2014)), *aff'd per curiam*, 777 F. App'x 516, 2019 BL 343921 (Fed. Cir. 2019); TMEP §1207.01(b).

Where the goods of an applicant and registrant are identical in part, as is the case here, the degree of similarity between the marks required to support a finding that confusion is likely declines. *See Cai v. Diamond Hong, Inc.*, 901 F.3d 1367, 1373, 127 USPQ2d 1797, 1801 (Fed. Cir. 2018); TMEP §1207.01(b).

In this instance, the applied-for mark "GUSHILL USA" encompasses the entirety of the registered mark "GUSHILL". Incorporating the entirety of one mark within another does not obviate the similarity between the compared marks, as in the present case, nor does it overcome a likelihood of confusion under Section 2(d). *See Wella Corp. v. Cal. Concept Corp.*, 558 F.2d 1019, 1022, 194 USPQ 419, 422 (C.C.P.A. 1977) (holding CALIFORNIA CONCEPT and surfer design and CONCEPT confusingly similar); TMEP §1207.01(b)(iii). In the present case, the marks are identical in part.

The inclusion of the term "USA" in the applied-for mark does not obviate the likelihood of confusion. Consumers are generally more inclined to focus on the first word in any trademark. *See Palm Bay Imps., Inc. v. Veuve Clicquot Ponsardin Maison Fondee En 1772*, 396 F.3d 1369, 1372, 73 USPQ2d 1689, 1692 (Fed. Cir. 2005) (finding similarity between VEUVE ROYALE and two VEUVE CLICQUOT marks in part because "VEUVE . . . remains a 'prominent feature' as the first word in the mark and the first word to appear on the label"). The first term in the applied-for mark is "GUSHILL", which is identical to the registered mark.

Further, as discussed below in *Disclaimer Required*, the term "USA" merely describes the geographic origin of the applicant's services. Although marks are compared in their entireties, one feature of a mark may be more significant or dominant in creating a commercial impression. *See In re Detroit Athletic Co.*, 903 F.3d 1297, 1305, 128 USPQ2d 1047, 1050 (Fed. Cir. 2018); TMEP §1207.01(b)(viii), (c)(ii). Matter that is descriptive of or generic for a party's goods is typically less significant or less dominant in relation to other wording in a mark. *See Anheuser-Busch, LLC v. Innvopak Sys. Pty Ltd.*, 115 USPQ2d 1816, 1824-25 (TTAB 2015). Thus, consumers are likely to perceive this wording as merely indicating the geographic region in which the goods are produced and sold and, instead, consider the shared term "GUSHILL" to be the source-indicating wording in the mark.

Based on the foregoing, the applied-for mark and registered mark are sufficiently similar to find a likelihood of confusion.

Comparison of Goods

The compared goods need not be identical or even competitive to find a likelihood of confusion. *See On-line Careline Inc. v. Am. Online Inc.*, 229 F.3d 1080, 1086, 56 USPQ2d 1471, 1475 (Fed. Cir. 2000); *Recot, Inc. v. Becton*, 214 F.3d 1322, 1329, 54 USPQ2d 1894, 1898 (Fed. Cir. 2000); TMEP §1207.01(a)(i). They need only be "related in some manner and/or if the circumstances surrounding their marketing are such that they could give rise to the mistaken belief that [the goods] emanate from the same source." *Coach Servs., Inc. v. Triumph Learning LLC*, 668 F.3d 1356, 1369, 101 USPQ2d 1713, 1722 (Fed. Cir. 2012) (quoting *7-Eleven Inc. v. Wechsler*, 83 USPQ2d 1715, 1724 (TTAB 2007)); TMEP §1207.01(a)(i).

Determining likelihood of confusion is based on the description of the goods stated in the application and registration at issue, not on extrinsic evidence of actual use. *See In re Detroit Athletic Co.*, 903 F.3d 1297, 1307, 128 USPQ2d 1047, 1052 (Fed. Cir. 2018) (citing *In re i.am.symbolic, llc*, 866 F.3d 1315, 1325, 123 USPQ2d 1744, 1749 (Fed. Cir. 2017)). Here, the application and registration have identical entries for "metal locking device for trailer hitch couplers". Additionally, these entries have no restrictions as to nature, type, channels of trade, or classes of purchasers and are "presumed to travel in the same channels of trade to the same class of purchasers." *In re Viterra Inc.*, 671 F.3d 1358, 1362, 101 USPQ2d 1905, 1908 (Fed. Cir. 2012) (quoting *Hewlett-Packard Co. v. Packard Press, Inc.*, 281 F.3d 1261, 1268, 62 USPQ2d 1001, 1005 (Fed. Cir. 2002)). Thus, applicant's and registrant's goods are identical in part and related. *See, e.g., In re i.am.symbolic, llc*, 127 USPQ2d 1627, 1629 (TTAB 2018).

Furthermore, the goods at issue are related because the goods commonly emanate from the same commercial entity. In support thereof, the examining attorney has attached Internet evidence from producers and retailers of trailer hitch and tow bar accessories ("Exhibit B"). This evidence establishes that the same entity, such as Rigid Hitch, commonly manufactures trailer hitches and two bars, metal locks for trailer hitches, and similar accessories, under the same mark, which are marketed and provided through the same trade channels and used by the same classes of consumers.

Thus, the goods of the applicant and registrant are considered related for likelihood of confusion purposes. *See, e.g., In re Davey Prods. Pty Ltd.*, 92 USPQ2d 1198, 1202-04 (TTAB 2009).

Conclusion

Because the applied-for mark and the registered mark are similar and the goods are related, registration is refused for a likelihood of confusion under Section 2(d).

Although applicant's mark has been refused registration, applicant may respond to the refusal by submitting evidence and arguments in support of registration. However, if applicant responds to the refusal, applicant must also respond to the requirements set forth below.

Name Inquiry

Applicant must clarify whether the name Gus Hill in the mark identifies a particular living individual and, if so, provide this individual's written consent to register the name. See 37 C.F.R. §2.61(b); TMEP §§813, 1206.03, 1206.04(a). To register a mark that includes or comprises the name of a particular living individual, including a first name, pseudonym, stage name, or nickname, an applicant must provide the individual's written consent to register the name, personally signed by the named individual. 15 U.S.C. §1052(c); TMEP §§813, 1206.03, 1206.04(a). In the present case, the application does not specify whether the name in the mark identifies a particular living individual nor does it include a written consent. See TMEP §§813.01(a)-(b), 1206.04(a), 1206.05.

If the name in the mark <u>does not</u> identify a particular living individual, applicant must submit a statement to that effect. TMEP §§813.01(b), 1206.05. The following format is suggested: "The name shown in the mark does not identify a particular living individual." TMEP §813.01(b).

If the name in the mark <u>does</u> identify a particular living individual, applicant must submit both of the following:

(1) **A statement** identifying the actual name of the individual and indicating that the name in the mark identifies this individual. TMEP §§813.01(a), 1206.04(a).

The following format is suggested: "The name shown in the mark identifies <specify actual name>, a living individual whose consent to register is made of record."

If the name is a pseudonym, stage name, or nickname, the following format is suggested: "Gus Hill identifies <specify actual name>, a living individual whose consent to register is made of record."

(2) **A written consent** for applicant to register the name, personally signed by the named individual. TMEP §§813, 1206.04(a).

The following format is suggested: "I, <specify actual name>, consent to the registration of my name, Gus Hill, as a trademark and/or service mark with the USPTO."

For an overview of the requirements for names appearing in marks, and instructions on how to satisfy the above requirements using the online Trademark Electronic Application System (TEAS) response form, see the Name or Likeness of a Particular Living Individual in a Trademark webpage.

Applicant has a duty to respond directly and completely to this requirement for information. *See In re Ocean Tech.*, *Inc.*, 2019 USPQ2d 450686, at *2 (TTAB 2019) (citing *In re AOP LLC*, 107 USPQ2d 1644, 1651 (TTAB 2013)); TMEP §814. Failure to comply with a requirement for information is an independent ground for refusing registration. *In re SICPA Holding SA*, 2021 USPQ2d 613, at *6 (TTAB 2021) (citing *In re Cheezwhse.com*, *Inc.*, 85 USPQ2d 1917, 1919 (TTAB 2008); *In re DTI P'ship LLP*, 67 USPQ2d 1699, 1701-02 (TTAB 2003); TMEP §814).

Additional Fee - Loss of TEAS Plus

Applicant must submit an additional processing fee of \$100 per class because the application as originally filed did not meet the TEAS Plus application filing requirements. See 37 C.F.R. §2.22(c); TMEP §§819.01-.01(q), 819.03. Specifically, applicant failed to meet the following requirement: a consent to register the mark from the person identified in the mark (or conversely, if appropriate, a statement that the name or portrait in the mark does not identify a living individual) was not provided.

The additional processing fee is required regardless of whether applicant satisfies these application requirements.

Accordingly, the application will no longer be treated as TEAS Plus; it is now considered a TEAS Standard application. *See* 37 C.F.R. §2.22(c); TMEP §819.03.

Disclaimer Required

Applicant must disclaim the wording "USA" because it is primarily geographically descriptive of the origin of applicant's goods. *See* 15 U.S.C. §§1052(e)(2), 1056(a); *In re Societe Generale des Eaux Minerales de Vittel S.A.*, 824 F.2d 957, 959, 3 USPQ2d 1450, 1451-52 (Fed. Cir. 1987); TMEP §§1210.01(a), 1210.06(a), 1213.03(a).

The attached evidence from The American Heritage and Wikipedia shows that USA is a generally

known geographic place or location, a country located in North America which is the third most populous in the world ("Exhibit C"). See TMEP §§1210.02 et seq. The goods for which applicant seeks registration originate in this geographic place or location as shown by applicant's address, which indicates it is in Florida, a state in the southeast of the United States ("Exhibit D"). See TMEP §1210.03. Because the goods originate in this place or location, a public association of the goodswith the place is presumed. See In re Hollywood Lawyers Online, 110 USPQ2d 1852, 1858 (TTAB 2014); TMEP §§1210.02(a) 1210.04.

Applicant may respond to this issue by submitting a disclaimer in the following format:

No claim is made to the exclusive right to use "USA" apart from the mark as shown.

The United States of America (U.S.A. or USA), commonly known as the United States (U.S. or US) or America, is a country primarily located in North America. It consists of 60 states, a federal district, five major unincorporated territories, nie Minor Cutlying Istancy and Indian reservations. The United States is the world's third-largest country by both land and total area. During the Cold War, both countries engaged in a struggle for ideological dominance but avoided direct military conflict. They also competed in the Space Race, which culminated in the 1969 landing of Apollo 11, making the U.S. the first and so far only nation to land humans on the Moon. With the Soviet Union's collapse and the subsequent end of the Cold War in 1991, the United States emerged as the world's sole superpower.

The United States government is a federal republic and a representative democracy with three separate branches of government. It has a bicameral national legislature composed of the House of Representatives, a lower house; and the Senate, an upper house based on equal representation for each state. Many policy issues are decentralized, with widely differing laves by jurisdiction. The U.S. ranks highly in international measures of quality of life, income and wealth, economic competitiveness, human rights, innovation, and education; it has low levels of perceived corruption and the highest median income per person of any polity in the world. The first documentary evidence of the phrase "United States of America" dates back to a letter from January 2, 1776, written by Stephen Moylan to Joseph Reed, George Washington's aide-de-camp. Moylan expressed his wish to go "with full and ampile powers from the United States of America to Spain" to seek assistance in the revolutionary war effort. [26]27[28] The first known publication of the phrase "United States of America" was in an anonymous essay in The Virginia Gazette newspaper in Williamsburg, on April 6, 1776 [29]

By June 1776, the name "United States of America" had appeared in drafts of the Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union, prepared by John Dickinson^{[30][31]} and of the Declaration of Independence, written by Thomas Jefferson.^[30]

It is generally accepted that the first inhabitants of North America migrated from Siberia by way of the Bering land bridge and arrived at least 12,000 years ago, however, some evidence suggests an even earlier date of arrival. ^{133,134,1153} The Clovis culture, which appeared around 11,000 BC, is believed to represent the first wave of human settlement of the Americas. ^{156,157} This was likely the first of three major waves of migration into North America; later waves brought the ancestors of present-day Athabaskans, Aleuts, and Eskitmos. ¹⁵⁰ Eskitmos. ¹⁵⁰

Over time, indigenous cultures in North America grew increasingly sophisticated, and some, such as the pre-Columbian Mississippian culture in the southeast, developed advanced agriculture,

architecture, and complex societies [39] The city-state of Cahokia is the largest, most complex pre-Columbian archaeological site in the modern-day United States [49] in the Four Corners region, Ancestral Puebloan culture developed from centuries of agricultural experimentation. [41] The Algonquian are one of the most populous and widespread North American Indigenous peoples. This grouping consists of the peoples who speak Algonquian languages. [42] Historically, these peoples were prominent along the Atlantic Coast and into the Interior along the Saint Lawrence River and around the Great Lakes. Before Europeans came into contact, most Algonquian settlements lived by hunting and fishing, although many supplemented their diet by cultivating com, beans, and squash (the "Three Sisters"). The Ojibwe cultivated wild rice. [43] The Haudenosaunee confederation of the Iroquois, located in the southern Great Lakes region, was established at some point between the twetth and filteenth centures. [44]

Ubelaker of the Smithsonian Institution estimated a population of 93,000 in the South Atlantic states and a ISO 3166 code population of 473,000 in the Gulf states,^[47] but most academics regard this figure as too low.^[45] Anthropologist Henry F. Successful English colonization of the eastern coast of North America began with the Virginia Colony in 1607 at Jamestown and with the Pilgrims' colony at Plymouth in 1620 [51][52]. The continent's first elected legislative assembly, Virginia's House of Burgesses, was founded in 1619. Harvard College was established in the Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1636 as the first institution of higher education. The Mayflower Compact and the Fundamental Orders of Connecticut established precedents for representative self-government and constitutionalism that would develop throughout the American colonies [351]564 (Amyr English settlers were dissenting Christians who came seeking religious freedom. The native population of America declined after European arrival for various reasons. [552569[37] primarily from diseases such as smallpox and measles. [549159] primarily from diseases such as smallpox and measles. the mid-1670s, the British had defeated and seized the territory of Dutch settlers in New Netherland, in the mid-Atlantic region.

Native Americans were also often flighting neighboring titbes and European settlers. In many cases the natives and settlers came to depend on each other. European missionaries and others felt it was important to "civilize" the Native Americans and urged them to adopt European agricultural practices and lifestyles. European settlers also began trafficking African slaves into Colonial America via the transatlantic slave trade. [64] By the turn of the 18th century, slavery had supplanted indentured servitude as the main source of agricultural labor for the cash crops in the American South. [65] Colonial society was divided over the religious and moral implications of slavery, and several colonies passed acts for or against the practice. [66][

The Thirteen Colonies [1] that would become the United States of America were administered by the British as overseas dependencies. [68] All nonetheless had local governments with elections open to white male property owners, except Jews and Catholics in some areas [69][70] With very high birth rates, low death rates, and steady

settlement, the colonial population grew rapidly, eclipsing Native American populations. [71] The Christian revivalist movement of the 1730s and 1740s known as the Great Awakening fueled interest both in religion and in religious liberty, [72] Excluding the Native Americans who lived there, the Thirteen Colonies had a population of over 2.1 million in 1770, about a third that of Britain, Despite continuing new arrivals, the rate of natural increase was such that by the 1770s only a small minority of Americans had been born overseas [73]. The colonies' distance from Britain had allowed the development of self-government, but their unprecedented success motivated British monarchs to

periodically seek to reassert royal authority.[74] Revolution and the new nation (1763-1815)

The American Revolution separated the Thirteen Colonies from the British Empire, and ensuing American Revolutionary War represented the first successful war of independence by a non-European entity against a



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European power in modern history. By the 18th century, the American Enlightenment and the political ph of liberalism were pervasive among leaders. Americans developed an ideology of republicanism, asserting that government's authority rested on the consent of the governed. They demanded their "rights as Englishmen" and "no taxation without representation". (75)[76] The British insisted on administering the colonies through a Parliament that did not have a single representative responsible for any American constituency, and the conflict escalated into

In 1774, the First Continental Congress, meeting in Philadelphia, passed the Continental Association, which mandated a colony-wide boycott of British goods. The American Revolutionary War began the following year. The Second Continental Congress, an assembly representing the United Colonies, unanimously adopted the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776 (annually celebrated as Independence Day). [78] The Declaration stated: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their



draft of the Declara al Congress, June 28, 1776,

stated: "We note these trusts to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalenable Rights, that among these are Life, Livery and the pursuit of Happiness." Stephen Lucas called it "one of the best-known sentences in the English language." [19] with historian Joseph Ellis writing that the document contains "the most potent and consequential words in American history." [80] During the British Colonial era, slavery was legal in all of the American colonies, composed a longstanding institution in world history, and "challenges to its moral legitimacy were rare". However, during the Revolution, many in the colonies began to question the practice. [81]

In 1781, the Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union established a decentralized government that operated until 1789. [78] In 1777, the American victory at the Battle of Saratoga resulted in the capture of a British army, and led to France and their ally Spain joining in the war against them. After the surrender of a second British army at the siege of Yorktown in 1781, Britain signed a peace treaty. American sovereignty became internationally recognized, and the new nation took possession of substantial territory east of the Mississippi River, from what is present-day Canada in the north and Florida in the south.[82]

As it became increasingly apparent that the Confederation was insufficient to govern the new country, nationalists advocated for and led the Philadelphia Convention of 1787, where the United States Constitution was authored and ratified in state conventions in 1788.

The U.S. Constitution is the oldest and longest-standing written and codified national constitution in force today. [83] Going into force in 1789, it reorganized the government into a federation administered by three branches (executive, judicial, and legislative), on the principle of creating salutary checks and balances. George Washington, who had led the Continental Army to victory and then willingly relinquished power, was the first President elected under the new constitution. The Bill of Rights, forbidding federal restriction of personal freedom and guaranteeing a range of legal protections, was adopted in 1791.^[64] The 1803 Louisiana Purchase almost doubled the nation's area. [85] Tensions with Britain remained, leading to the War of 1812, which was fought to a draw. [86] Spain ceded Florida and other Gulf Coast territory in 1819. [87]

Regional divisions over slavery grew in the proceeding decades. In the North, several prominent Founding Fathers such as John Adams. Roger Sherman, Alexander Hamilton, John Jav, and Benjamin Franklin advocated for the abolition of slavery, and by the 1810's every state in the region had, with these emancipations being the first in the Atlantic World. [86] The Missouri Compromise (1820) admitted Missouri as a slave state and Maine as a free state and declared a policy of prohibiting slavery in the remaining Louisiana Purchase lands north of the 36°30' parallel. The outcome *de facto* sectionalized the country into two factions: free states, which forbade slavery; and slave states, which protected the institution; it was controversial, widely seen as dividing the country along sectarian

In the South, the invention of the cotton gin spurred entrenchment of slavery, with regional elites and intellectuals increasingly viewing the institution as a positive good instead of a necessary evil. [30] Although the federal government outlawed American participation in the Atlantic slave trade in 1807, after 1820, cultivation of the highly profitable cotton crop exploded in the Deep South, and along with it, the use of slave labor [91](92][93] The Second Great Awakening, especially in the period 1800–1840, converted millions to evangelical Protestantism. In the North, it energized multiple social reform movements, including abolitionism.^[94] in the South, Methodists and Baptists proselytized among slave populations.^[95]



In the late 18th century, American settlers began to expand further westward, some of them with a sense of manifest destiny. [96][97] The 1803 Louisiana Purchase almost doubled the nation's area [198] Spain ceded Florida and other Gulf Coast territory in 1819 [199] the Republic of Texas was annexed in 1845 during a period of expansionism, [97] and the 1846 Oregon Treaty with Britain led to U.S. control of the present-day American Northwest [199] as it expanded further into land inhabited by Native Americans, the federal government often applied policies of Indian removal or assimilation [199] The Trail of Tears

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Civil War and Reconstruction (1860–1876)

Irreconcilable sectional conflict regarding the enslavement of those of black African descent^[168] was the primary cause of the American Civil War ^[169] With the 1860 election of Republican Abraham Lincoln, conventions in eleven stave states—all in the Southern United States—declared secession and formed the Confederate States of America, while the federal government (the "Union") maintained that secession was unconstitutional and illegitimate, ^[116] On April 12, 1861, the Confederacy initiated military conflict by bombarding Fort Sumter, a federal garrison in Charleston harbor, South Carolina. The ensuing Civil War (1661–1865) was the deadliest military conflict in American history resulting in the deaths of approximately 620,000 soldiers from both sides and upwards of 5,000 civilians, almost all of them in the South. ^[191]

Reconstruction began in earnest following the defeat of the Confederates. While President Lincoln attempted to foster reconciliation between the Union and former Confederacy, his assassination on April 14, 1865 drove a wedge between North and South again. Republicans in the federal openment made it their goal to oversee the rebuilding of the South and to ensure the rights of African Americans, and the so-called Reconstruction. Amendments to the Constitution guaranteed the abolishment of slavery, full citizenship to Americans of African descent, and surfrage for adult Black males. They persisted until the Compromise of 1877; Infleential Southern



descent, and suffrage for adult Black males. They persisted until the Compromise of 1877. Influential Southern whites, calling themselves "Redeemers", took local control of the South after the end of Reconstruction, beginning the nadir of American race relations. From 1890 to 1910, the Redeemers established so-called Jim Crow laws, disenfranchising almost all blacks and some impoverished whites throughout the region. Blacks would face racial segregation nationwide, especially in the South. [112] They also lived under constant threat of vigilante violence, including Nnching, [113]

Development of modern America (1876-1914)

National infrastructure, including telegraph and transcontinental railroads, spurred economic growth and greater settlement and development of the American Old West. After the American Coult War, new transcontinental railways made relocation easier for settlere, expanded internal trade, and increased conflicts with Native Americans, [115]

Mainland expansion also included the purchase of Alaska from Russia in 1867. [^{116]} in 1893, pro-American elements in Hawaii overthrew the Hawaiiam monarchy and formed the Republic of Hawaii, which the U.S. annexed in 1888. Puerlo Rich, Guam, and the Philippines were ceded by Spain in the same year, by the Treaty of Paris (1898) following the Spanish-American War. [^{117]} Neither the Foraker Act (1900), nor the Insular Cases (1901) accorded US citizenship to Puerto Ricans. One month prior to American entry into World War I, citizenship was extended to Puerto Ricans via the Jones-Sharfort Act (1917). [^{118]}26–38. In November 1993, the US acquired a perpetual lease of the Panama Canal Zone via the Hay–Bunau-Varilla Treaty after providing naval aid preventing Colombia from putting down the rebellion which led to the creation of an independent Panama. Rapid economic development during the late 19th and early 20th centuries fostered the rise of many prominent industrialists. Tyccons like Comelius Vanderbilt, John D. Rockefeller, and Andrew Camegie led the nation's progress in the railroad, petroleum, and stell industries. Banking became a major part of the economy, with J. P. Morgan playing a notable role. The United States also emerged as a pioneer of the automotive industry in the early 20th century. ¹²² in the North, urbanization and an unprecedented influx of immigrants from Southern and Eastern Eurose supplied a surplus of labor for the country's industrialization. ¹²³ Electric light and the telephone drastically



changed communication and urban life.[124]

The American economy boomed, becoming the world's largest. [125] These dramatic changes were accompanied by significant increases in economic inequality, immigration, and social unrest, which prompted the rise of organized labor along with populist, socialist, and anarchist movements. [126][127][123] This period eventually ended with the advent of the Progressive Era, which saw significant reforms including health and safety regulation of consumer goods, the rise of labor unions, and greater antitrust measures to ensure competition among businesses and attention to worker conditions. The last vestiges of the Progressive Era resulted in women's suffrage and alcohol prohibition. [130][131][132] The first state to grant women the right to vote was Wyoming, in 1869, followed by some other states^[133] before the women's rights movement won passage of a constitutional amendment granting nationwide w 1920. [134] The United States remained neutral from the outbreak of World War I in 1914 until 1917 when it joined the war as an "associated power" alongside the Allies of World War I, helping to turn the tide against the Central



Powers, In 1919, President Woodrow Wilson took a leading diplomatic role at the Paris Peace Conference and advocated strongly for the U.S. to join the League of Nations. However, the Senate refused to approve this and did not ratify the Treaty of Versailles that established the League of Nations.

The 1920s and 1930s saw the rise of radio for mass communication and the invention of early television. [136] The prosperity of the Roaring Twenties ended New Deal economic policies [1937] The Dust Bowl of the mid-1930s impoverished many farming communities and spurred a new wave of western migration. [198] with the Wall Street Crash of 1929 and the onset of the Great Depression, After his election as President in 1932, Franklin D. Roosevelt responded with the

At first neutral during World War II, the United States began supplying war materiel to the Allies in March 1941. A total of \$50.1 billion (equivalent to \$719 billion in 2021) worth of supplies was shipped in 1941–1945, or 17% of the total war expenditures of the U.S ^[139] On December 7, 1941, the Empire of Japan launched a surprise attack on Pearl Harbor, prompting the United States to militarily join the Allies against the Axis powers, and in the following year, to intern about 120,000 Japanese and Japanese Americans [140][141]. The U.S. pursued a "Europe first" defense policy, [142] with the Philippines being invaded and occupied by Japan until the country's liberation by the U.S.-led forces in 1944–1945. During the war, the United States was one of the "Four Policemen*(143) who met to plan the postwar world, along with Britain, the Soviet Union, and China (144)(145). The United States emerged relatively unscathed from the war, and with even greater economic and military influence. [146]



The United States played a leading role in the Bretton Woods and Yalta conferences, which signed agreements on new international financial institutions and Europe's postwar reorganization. As an Allied victory was act Europe, a 1945 international conference held in San Francisco produced the United Nations Charter, which became active after the war. [147] The United States developed the first nuclear weapons and used them on Japan in the cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in August 1945; the Japanese subsequently surrendered on September 2, ending World War II, ¹⁴⁸ (149) (

Postwar America (1945-2000)

After World War II, the United States financed and implemented the Marshall Plan to help rebuild and econo revive war-torn Europe; disbursements paid between 1948 and 1952 would total \$13 billion (\$115 billion in 2021).[150] Also at this time, geopolitical tensions between the United States and Soviet Russia led to the Cold War, driven by an ideological divide between capitalism and communism; [151] The two countries dominated the military affairs of Europe, with the U.S. and its NATO allies on one side and the Soviet Union and its Warsaw Pact satellite states on the other.[152] Unlike the US, the USSR concentrated on its own recovery, seizing and transferring most of Germany's industrial plants, and it exacted war reparations from its Soviet Bloc satellites using Soviet-dominated joint enterprises [n][153] The U.S. sometimes opposed Third World movements that it viewed as Soviet-sponsored, occasionally pursuing direct action for regime change against left-wing governments, [154]

American troops found the communist forces in the Korean War of 1950–1953 [155] and the LLS, became



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increasingly involved in the Vietnam War (1955–1975), introducing combat forces in 1965.^[156] Their competition to

achieve superior spaceflight capability led to the Space Race, which culminated in the U.S. becoming the first and only nation to land people on the Moon in 1969 [155]. While both countries engaged in proxy wars and developed powerful nuclear weapons, they avoided direct military conflict. [152]

At home, the United States experienced sustained economic expansion, urbanization, and a rapid growth of its population and middle class following World War II. Construction of an interstate Highway System transformed the nation's transportation infrastructure in decades to come. [157][158] in 1959, the United States admitted Alaska and Hawaii to become the 49th and 50th states, formally expanding beyond the contiguous United States. [159]

The growing civil rights movement used nonviolence to confront racism, with Martin Luther King Jr. becoming a prominent leader. (180) President Lyndon B. Johnson initiated legislation that led to a series of policies addressing poverty and racial inequalities, in what he termed the "Great Society". The launch of a "War on Poverty" expanded entitlements and welfare spending, leading to the creation of the Food Stamp Program, Ald to Families with Dependent Children, along with national health insurance programs Medicare and Medicaid. [161] A combination of Contractions and legislation, culminating in the Civil Rights Act of 1968, made significant improvements [162][163][164] Meanwhile, a counterculture movement grew, which was fueled by opposition to the Vietnam War, mainstream experimentation with psychedelics and cannabis, the Black Power movement, and the sexual revolution [1967] The women's movement in the U.S. broadened the debate on women's rights and made gender equality a major social goal. The 1960s Sexual Revolution liberalized American attitudes to sexuality and eventually spread to the rest of the developed word, [166][167] and the 1969 Stonewall riots in New York City

marked the beginning of the modern gay rights movement in the West. [168][169] The United States supported Israel during the Yom Kippur War, in response, the country faced an oil embargo from OPEC nations, sparking the 1973 oil crisis. The presidency of Richard Nixon saw the American withdrawal from Vietnam but also the Watergate scandal, which led to his resignation and a decline in public trust of government that expanded for decades ^[170] After a surge in female labor participation around the 1970s, by 1985, the majority of women aged 16 and over were employed ^[171] The 1970s and early 1980s also saw the onset of stagitation.

After his election in 1980, President Ronald Reagan responded to economic stagnation with neoliberal reform and accelerated the rollback strategy towards the Soviet Union after its invasion of Afghanistan 1731/174[175]. During Reagan's presidency, the federal debt held by the public nearly tripled in nominal terms, from \$738 billion to \$2.1 trillion. [179] This led to the United States moving from the world's largest international creditor to the world's largest debtor nation. [177] The collapse of the USSR's network of satellite states in Eastern Europe in 1989 and the subsequent dissolution of the country itself in 1991 ended the Cold War with American victory. ensuring a global unipolarity^[182] in which the U.S. was unchallenged as the world's sole superpower.^[183]



Fearing the spread of regional international instability from the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait, in August 1991, President George H. W. Bush launched and led the Gulf War against Iraq, expelling Iraqi forces and dissolving the Iraqi backed puppet state in Kuwait. [184] During the administration of President Bill Clinton in 1994, the U.S. signed the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), causing trade among the U.S., Canada, and Mexico to soar. Due to the dot-com boom, stable monetary policy, and reduced social welfare spending, the 1990s saw the longest

New millennium (2000-present)

On September 11, 2001, al-Qaeda terrorist hijackers flew passenger planes into the World Trade Center in New York City and the Pentagon near Washington, D.C., killing nearly 3,000 people. [187] In response, President George W. Bush launched the war on terror, which included a nearly 20-year war in Afghanistan from 2001 to 2021 and the 2003–2011 Iraq War. [180] [180] Government policy designed to promote affordable housing. [180] widespread failures in corporate and regulatory governance. [181] and historically low interest rates set by the Federal Reserve⁽¹⁸²⁾ led to a housing bubble in 2006. This culminated in the financial crisis of 2007–2008 and the Great Recession, the nation's largest economic contraction since the Great Depression.^[183]

Barack Obama, the first multiracial [194] President with African-American ancestry, was elected in 2008 amid the financial crisis, [195] His signature legislative accomplishment was the Affordable Care Act (ACA), popularly known as "Obamacare". It represented the U.S. health care system's most significant regulatory overhaul and expansion of coverage since Medicare in 1965. As a result, the uninsured share of the population was cut in half, while the number of newly insured Americans was estimated to be between 20 and 24 million. [196]



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> Culture and society See also Notes After Obama served two terms, Republican Donald Trump was elected as the 45th president in 2016. His election is viewed as one of the biggest political upsets in American and world history. [1977] Trump held office through the first waves of the COVID-19 pandemic and the resulting COVID-19 recession starting in 2020 that exceeded even the Great Recession earlier in the century. [198]

Political polarization increased beginning in the 2010s, with abortion access, same-sex marriage, the transgender rights movement, lingering systemic racism, police brutality, undocumented immigration, mass shootings and recreational marijuana use become among the largest in U.S. history. [199][200] On January 6, 2021, supporters of the outgoing President Trump stormed the U.S. Capitol in an unsuccessful effort or disrupt the Electoral College vote count that would confirm Democrat Joe Bilden as the 45th moseisters [201].

In 2022, the Supreme Court ruled that there is no constitutional right to an abortion, causing another wave of profests [202] The United States responded to Russia and Belarus after their invasion of Ukraine, with the country applying harsh sanctions on Russia and sending tens of billions of dollars of military and humanitarian aid to [1877ane [203]]

The 48 contiguous states and the District of Columbia occupy a combined area of 3,119,885 square miles (8,080,470 km²). Of this area, 2,959,064 square miles (7,663,940 km²) is contiguous land, composing 83,65% of total U.S. land area (2649,269) About 15% is occupied by Alaska, a state in northwestern North America, with the remainder in Hawaii, a state and archipelago in the central Pacific, and the five populated but unincorporated insular territories of Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands, ²⁰⁰⁸ Measured by only land area, the United States is third in size behind Russia and China, and just

The United States is the world's third- or fourth-largest nation by total area (land and water), ranking behind Russia and Canada and nearly equal to China. The ranking varies depending on how two termiones disputed by China and India are counted, and how the total size of the United States is measured. [1828]

The coastal plain of the Atlantic seaboard gives way further inland to deciduous forests and the rolling hills of the Piledmont, ¹²⁹⁹ The Appalachian Mountains and the Adriondack massif divide the eastern seaboard from the Great Lakes and the grasslands of the Midwest, ¹²¹⁰ The Mississippi—Missouri River, the world's fourth longest river system, runs mainly north—south through the heart of the country. The flat, fertile prairie of the Great Plains stretches to the west, interrupted by a highland region in the southeast, ¹²¹⁰

The Rocky Mountains, west of the Great Plains, extend north to south across the country, peaking at over 14,000 feet (4,300 m) in Colorado (2¹⁴) Father west are the rocky Great Basin and deserts such as the Chilhuabua, Sonoran, and Mojave, (2¹⁴) The Sierra Nevada and Cascade mountain ranges run Lose to the Pacific coast, both ranges also reaching altitudes higher than 14,000 feet (4,300 m). Climate

The United States, with its large size and geographic variety, includes most climate types. To the east of the 100th meridian, the climate ranges from humid continental in the north to humid subtropical in the south.^[217]

The Great Plains west of the 100th meridian are semi-arid. Many mountainous areas of the American West have an alpine climate. The climate is arid in the Great Basin, desert in the Southwest, Mediterranean in coastal California, and oceanic in coastal Oregon and Washington and southern Alaska. Most of Alaska is subarctic or polar. Hawaii and the southern tip of Florida are tropical, as well as its territories in the Caribbean and the Pacific. [218]

States bordering the Gulf of Mexico are prone to hurricanes, and most of the world's tornadoes occur in the



country, mainly in Tomado Alley areas in the Midwest and South. [218] Overall, the United States receives more high-impact extreme weather incidents than any other country in the world. [2]

Extreme weather has become more frequent in the U.S., with three times the number of reported heat waves as in the 1960s. Of the ten warmest years ever recorded in the 48 contiguous states, eight have occurred since 1998. In the American Southwest, droughts have become more persistent and more severe. [221]

Biodiversity and conservation

The U.S. is one of 17 megao verse countries containing large numbers of ender of vascular plants occur in the contiguous United States and Alaska, and more than 1,800 species of flowering plants are found in Hawaii, few of which occur on the maintand. There are 63 national parks which are managed by the National Park Service, and hundreds of other federally managed parks, forests, and wilderness areas managed by it and other agencies ^[226] Altogether, the government owns about 28% of the country's land area. ^[227] mostly in the western states. ^[228] Most of this land is protected, though some is leased for oil and gas drilling, mining, logging, or cattle ranching, and about .86% is used for military purposes [229[230]

Environmental issues include debates on oil and nuclear energy, air and water pollution, protecting wildlife, logging and deforestation, E²³1(2²²⁾ and climate change, E²³3(2²³⁾ fire most prominent environmental apency is the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), created by presidential order in 1970 [^{235]} The idea of wilderness has shaped the management of public lands since 1964, with the Wilderness Act. [^{250]} The Endangered Species Act of

1973 is intended to protect threatened and endangered species and their habitats, which are monitored by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, [237] As of 2020, the U.S. ranked 24th among 180 nations in the Environmental Performance Index. [238] The country Joined the Paris Agreement on climate change in 2016, and has many other environmental commitments. [239] [t withdrew from the Paris Agreement in 2020[240] but rejoined it in 2021, [241]

Government and politics

The United States is a federal republic of 50 states, a federal district, five territories and several uninhabited island The United States is a federal republic of 50 states, a federal district, five territories and several uninhabited islam possessions. §242493444 It is the world's oldest surviving federation and, according for the World Economic Forum, the oldest democracy as well. [249] It is a liberal representative democracy "in which majority rule is tempered by mimority rights protected by law, "449] Major democracy indexes uniformly classify the country as a liberal democracy."4471 The 2022 Corpution Perceptions Index and Global Corruption Barometer rank the United States as having low levels of both actual and perceived corruption. [249][249]

The federal government comprises three branches, which are headquartered in Washington, D.C. and regulated by a system of checks and balances defined by the Constitution. [250] The bicameral Congress, made up of the Senate and the House of Representatives, makes federal law, declares war, approves treaties, has the power of the purse, [251] and has the power of impeachment, by which it can remove sitting members of the federal government. [252] The president is the commander-in-chief of the military, can veto legislative bills before they become law (subject to congressional override), and appoints the members of the Cabinet (subject to Senate approval) and other officers, who administer and enforce federal laws and policies through their respective agencies. [253] The Supreme Court and lower federal courts, whose judges are appointed by the President with Senate approval, interpret laws and overturn those they find unconstitutional. [254]

The President serves a four-year term and may be elected to the office no more than twice. The President is not elected by direct vote, but by an indirect electoral college system in which the determining votes are apportioned to the states and the District of Columbia. [255] The Supreme Court, led by the chief justice of the United States, has nine members, who serve for life. They are appointed by the sitting President when a vacancy becomes

The U.S. Constitution serves as the country's supreme legal document, establishing the structure and

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responsibilities of the federal government and its relationship with the individual states. The Constitution has been amended 27 times [155] the first ten amendments (Bill of Rights) and the Fourteenth Amendment from the central basis of Americans' Individual rights. All laws and governmental procedures are subject to judicial review, and any law can be voided if the courts determine that it violates the Constitution. The principle of judicial review, not

explicitly mentioned in the Constitution, was established by the Supreme Court in Marbury v. Madison (1803). [258]

In the American federal system, sovereignty is shared between two levels of government: federal and state. Citizens of the states are also governed by local governments, which are administrative divisions of the states. The territories are administrative divisions of the federal government. Government amany issues is occintrative, 2019.

The United States has operated under an uncodified informal two-party system for most of its history, although other parties have run candidates [280]. What the two major parties are has changed over time: the Republicans and Democrats presently are, and the country is currently in either the Fifth or Sixth Party System. [261]. Both parties have no formal central organization at the national level that controls membership, elected officials or political policies; thus, each party has traditionally had factions and individuals that deviated from party positions. [282] Since the 2000s, the country has suffered from significant political polarization. [263]

Political subdivisions

Each of the 50 states holds jurisdiction over a geographic territory, where it shares sovereignty with the federal government. They are subdivided into counties or county equivalents, and further divided into municipalities. The District of Columbia is a federal district that contains the capital of the United States, the city of Washington 2⁵⁶⁴ Each state has an amount of presidential electors equal to the number of their representatives plus senators in Congress, and the District of Columbia has three electors 2⁵⁶⁵ Territories of the United States do not have presidential electors, therefore people there cannot vote for the president 2⁵⁶⁶

Citizenship is granted at birth in all states, the District of Columbia, and all major U.S. territories except American Samoa [8]270[257]. The United States observes limited tribal sovereignity of the American Indian nations, like states' sovereignity. American Indians are U.S. citizens and tribal lands are subject to the jurisdiction of the U.S. Congress and the Tederal courts. Like the states, tribes have some autonomy restrictions. They are prohibited from making war, engaging in their own foreign relations, and printing or issuing independent currency. [271] Indian reservations are usually contained within one state, but there are 12 reservations that cross state boundaries. [272]



Foreign relations

The United States has an established structure of foreign relations, and it had the world's second-largest diplomatic corps in 2019.^[273] It is a permanent member of the United Nations Security Council, ^[274] and home to

the United Nations headquarters. (2^{78}) The United States is also a member of the G7, (2^{78}) G20, (2^{77}) and OECD intergovernmental organizations. (2^{78}) Aimost all countries have embassies and many have consulates (official representatives) in the country. Likewise, energy all nations host formal diplomatic insistons with United States, except Iran, (2^{78}) North Korea, (2^{78}) and Brutan, (2^{81}) Though Taiwan does not have formal diplomatic relations with the U.S., it maintains closes, if unofficial, relations (2^{81}) The United States also regularly supplies Taiwan with military equipment to deter potential Chinese aggression. In South America, Colombia is traditionally considered to be the closest ally of the United States 18²⁰¹ The U.S. exercises Uniternational defense authority and responsibility for Micronesta, the Marshall Islands, and Palau through the Compact of Free Association 12²⁰¹ it has increasingly conducted strategic cooperation with india, 12²⁰² and its lies with China have steadily deteriorated 12²⁰⁸(12²⁰⁷) The U.S. has become a key ally of Ukraine since Russia annexed Crimea in 2014 and began an invasion of Ukraine in 2022, significantly deteriorating relations with Russia in the process (12²⁰⁸(12²⁰⁸)

The President is the commander-in-chief of the United States Armed Forces and appoints its leadquartered at the secretary of defense and the Joint Chiefs of Staff. The Department of Defense, which is headquartered at the Pentagon near Washington, D. C., administers the of the six service branches, which are made up of the Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, and Space Force. The Coast Guard is administered by the Department of Homeland Security in peacetime and can be transferred to the Department of the Navy, in wartime [1990] The United States spent \$377 billion on its military in 2022, 39% of global military spending, accounting for 3.5% of the country's Opt-1991/18021 The U.S. has more than 40% of the world's nuclear weapons, the second-largest amount after Russial [1990]

In 2019, all six branches of the U.S. Armed Forces reported 1.4 million personnel on active duty.^[0,64] The Reserve and National Guard brought the total number of troops to 2.3 million.^[0,64] The Department of Defense also employed about 700,000 civilians, not including contractors.^[0,64] Military service in the United States is voluntary, although conscription may occur in wartime through the Selective Service System.^[0,69] The United States has the third-largest combined armed forces in the world, behind the Chinese People's Liberation Army and Indian Armed Forces.^[0,70]

Today, American forces can be rapidly deployed by the Air Force's large fleet of transport aircraft, the Navy's 11 active aircraft carriers, and Marine expeditionary units at sea with the Navy, and Army's XVIII Airborne Corps and 75th Ranger Regiment deployed by Air Force transport aircraft. The Air Force can strike targets across the globe through its fleet of strategic bombers, maintains the air defense across the United States, and provides close air support to Army and Marine Corps ground forces \$\text{S0031309}\$





D.C., is home to the U.S. Department of Defense.

The Space Force operates the Global Positioning System (GPS, also widespread in civilian use worldwide), the Eastern and Western Ranges for all space launches, and the United States's Space Surveillance and Missile Warning networks [310][311]312] The military operates about 800 bases and facilities abroad, [313] and maintains deployments greater than 100 active duty personnel in 25 foreign countries [314]

As of January 2023, the United States has the sixth highest per-capita incarceration rate in the world, at 531 people per 100,000, and the largest prison and jall population in the world at 1,767,200 [321][322] in 2019, the total prison population for those sentenced to more than a year was 1,430,800, corresponding to a ratio of 419 per 100,000 residents and the lowest since 1995. [13] As of 2022, the United States was ranked 25th out of 169 countries on the Social Progress Index, which measures "the extent to which countries provide for the social and environmental needs of their citizens." [332] The U.S. has been the world's largest economy since at least 1900. [333]

The United States is at or near the forefront of technological advancement and innovation[334] in many economic fields, especially in artificial intelligence; computers; pharmaceuticals; and medical, aerospace and military equipment. [335] The nation's economy is fueled by abundant natural resources, a well-developed infrastructure, and high productivity. [336] It has the second-highest total-estimated value of natural resources, valued at uses 44.98 full in 2019, although sources differ on their estimates. Americans have the highest average household and employee income among OECD member states. [3377] In 2013, they had the sixth-highest median household income, down from fourth-highest in 2010. [338(339)]

The U.S. dollar is the currency most used in international transactions and is the world's foremost reserve The U.S. dollar is the currency most used in international transactions and is the word's oriented reserved currency, backed by the country's dominant economy, its milliarly, the pertodollar system, and its linked eurodollar and large U.S. treasuries market, ^[284] several countries use it as their official currency and in others it is the decado currency, ^{[340][341]} (New York City is the world's principal financial center, with the largest economic output, and the epicenter of the principal American metropolitan economy, ^{[340][340][341]} The New York Stock Exchange and Nasdaq are the world's largest stock exchanges by market capitalization and trade volume. The largest U.S. trading partners are the European Union, Mexico, Canada, China, Japan, South Korea, the United Kingdom, Vietnam, India, and Talwam, India United States is the world's largest importer and the secon largest exporter after China I³⁴⁸ I has free trade agreements with several counties, including the USMcC, I⁵⁴⁹ The U.S. ranked second in the Global Competitiveness Report in 2019, after Singapore, I⁵⁵⁹ Many of the world's largest companies, such as Alphabet (Google), Amazon, AT&T, Apple, Coca-Cola, Disney, General Motors McDonald's, Nike, Meta, Microsoft, Pepsi, and Walmart, were founded and are headquartered in the United States. [351] Of the world's 500 largest companies, 124 are headquartered in the U.S. [351].

While its economy has reached a post-industrial level of development, the United States remains an industrial ower INSE/2A of 2018, the U.S. is the second-largest manufacturing nation after China. INSE/2D espite the fact that the U.S. only accounted for 4.24% of the global population, residents of the U.S. collectively possessed 31.5% of the world's total wealth as of 2021, the largest percentage of any country. [354] The U.S. also ranks first in the number of dollar billionaires and millionaires, with 724 billionaires (as of 2021) ³⁵⁵⁹. and nearly 22 million millionaires (2021). [356]

However, wealth in the United States is highly concentrated; the richest 10% of the adult population own 72% of the country's household wealth, while the bottom 50% own just 2% ¹⁵⁸⁹ income inequality in the U.S. remains at record highs; ¹⁵⁹⁹ with the top fifth of earners taking home more than half of all income^[1590] and giving the U.S. one of the widest income distributions among OECD members; ³⁸⁹ I have were about 582,500 sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons in the U.S. in 2022, with 60% staying in an emergency shelter of transitional housing program. ¹²⁹² In 2018 six million children experience food insecurity. ¹⁵⁹³ Feeding America estimates that around one in severa children or procryotrated video.

It is the only advanced economy that does not guarantee its workers paid vacation nationally. ⁽³⁶⁷⁾ and is one of a few countries in the world without federal paid family leave as a legal right. ⁽³⁶⁸⁾ The United States also has a higher percentage of low-income workers had almost any other developed nation, largely because of a weak collective bargaining system and lack of government support for at-risk workers. ⁽³⁶⁹⁾

Science, technology, and energy

[379] in 2022, the U.Br. clarked second by the number of patient applications, and third by trademank and industrial design applications. [373] in 2021, the U.Br. that States launched a total of 51 spaceflights; 10 U.Br. had 2,944 active satellites in space in December 2021, the highest number of any country [379] in 2022, the United States ranked 2nd in the Global Innovation index [379].

As of 2021, the United States receives approximately 79.1% of its energy from fossil fuels; ^[177] in 2021, the largest source of the country's energy came from petroleum (36.1%), followed by natural gas (32.2%), coal (10.8%), renewable sources (12.5%), and nuclear power (48.5%), ^[77] The United States constitutes less than 5% of the world's population, but consumes 17% of the

renewable sources (12.5%), and nuclear power (6.4%) [377] The United States constitutes less than 5% of the world's population, but consumes 17% of the world's pergy. [378] It accounts for about 25% of the world's petroleum consumption, while producing only 6% of the world's annual petroleum supply. Personal transportation in the United States is dominated by automobiles, [386] which operate on a network of 4 million miles (6.4 million kilometers) of public coads, making it the longest network in the word, [386]387] The Oldsmobile Curved Dash and the Ford Model T, both American cars, are considered the first mass-produced [388] and mass-affordable [389] cars, respectively, As of 2022, the United States is the second-largest manufacturer of motor vehicles [380] and is home to Testa, the word's most valuable car company [381] American automotive company General Motors held the title of the world's best-selling automater from 1931 to 2008 [382] Currently, the American automotive industry is the world's second-largest automobile market by sales [383] and the U.S. has the

highest vehicle ownership per capita in the world, with 816.4 vehicles per 1,000 Americans (2014) [394]. In 2017, there were 255 million non-two wheel motor vehicles, or about 910 vehicles per 1,000 people. [385]

The American civil airline indiustry is entirely privately owned and has been largely deregulated since 1978, while most major airports are publicly owned. [398] The three largest airlines in the world by passengers carried are U.S.-based, American Airlines is number one after its 2013 acquisition by U.S. Airways [597] Of the world's 50 busiest passenger airports, 16 are in the United States, including the top five and the busiest, Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport, 1398(1399) As of 2020, there are 19,919 airports in the United States, of which 5,217 are designated as "public use", including for general aviation and other activities (**00**).

Of the fifty busiest container ports, four are located in the United States, of which the busiest is the Port of Los Angeles. [401] The country's inland waterways are the world's fifth-longest, and total 41,009 km (25,482 mi), [402]

The U.S. Census Bureau reported 331,449,281 residents as of April 1, 2020. [9](404) making the United States the third most populous nation in the world, after China and India. [405] According to the Bureau's U.S. Population Clock on January 28, 2021, the U.S. population had a net gain of one person every 100 seconds, or about 864 people per day. [409] In 2018, 52% of Americans age 15 and over were married, 6% were vidowed, 10% were divorced, and 32% had never been married. [407] In 2021, the total Tertility rate for the U.S. stood at 1.7 children per woman, [408] and it had the world's highest rate of children (23%) living in single-parent households in 2019 [409]

The United States has a diverse population, 37 ancestry groups have more than one million members, [419] White Americans with ancestry from Europe, the Middle East or North Africa, from the largest racial and ethnic group at 57.8% of the United States population, [419,442] lappaine and Latino Americans form the second-largest group and are 18.7% of the United States population. African Americans constitute the nation's third-largest ancestry group and are 12.1% of the United States population, [410] stan Americans are the country's fourth-largest group, composing 5.9% of the United States population, while the country's 3.7 million Native Americans account for about 1%, [419] in 2020, the median age of the United States population was 38.5 years. [459]

Immigration

The United States has by far the highest number of immigrant population in the world, with 50.661,149 people. [413](414] In 2018, there were almost 90 million immigrants and U.S.-born children of immigrants in the United States, accounting for 28% of the overall U.S. population [413] In 2017, out of the U.S. foreign-born population, some 45% (2.07 million) were naturalized citizens, 27% (12.3 million) were lamful permanent residents, 6% (2.2 million) were temporary lawful residents, and 29% (10.5 million) were unauthorized timmigrants. [416]

The United States led the world in refugee resettlement for decades, admitting more refugees than the rest of the world combined [417]

Language

While many languages are spoken in the United States, English is the most common. [418] Although there is no official language at the federal level, some laws—such as U.S. naturalization requirements—standardize English, and most states have declared English as the official language. [419] Three states and bru U.S. territories have recognized local or indigenous languages in addition to English, including Hawaii (Hawaiian). [429] Alaska (Iwenty Native languages). 

The First Amendment guarantees the free exercise of religion and forbids Congress from passing laws respecting its establishment. [428](439] The country has the world's largest Christian population. [431] and a majority of Americans identify as Christian, predominately Catholic, maintine Professant, or evangelical. According to Gallup, 58% and 17% reporting parking often or sometimes, respectively, and 45% and 25% reporting that religion plays a very important or



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fairly important role, respectively, in their lives $^{(432)}_{1}$ Most do not regularly attend religious services $^{(425)}_{1}$ and have low confidence in religious institutions. $^{(433)}_{1}$ Until the 1990s, the country was a significant outlier among highly developed countries, notably having a high level of religiosity and wealth, atthough this has lessened since. $^{(436)}_{1}_{1}$ (435)

According to Gallup and Pew 81–90% of Americans believe in a higher power $^{(438)(437)}$ while "31% report attending a church, synagogue, mosque or temple weekly or nearly weekly today." $^{(438)}$ in the "Bible Belt", located within the Southern United States, evangelical Protestantism plays a significant role culturally. New England and the Western United States tend to be less religious. [427] Around 6% of Americans claim a non-Christian faith, [434] the largest of which are Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, and Buddhism, [439] The United States either has the first or second-largest Jewish population in the world, the largest outside of Israel [440] "Ceremonial deism" is common in American culture. [429][441] Around 30% of Americans describe themselves as having no religion. [454] Membership in a house of worship fell from 70% in 1999 to 47% in 2020. [442]

Urhanization

About 82% of Americans live in urban areas, including suburbs, ^[2080] about half of those reside in cities with populations over 50,000. ^[443] in 2008, 273 incorporated municipalities had populations over 100,000, nine cities had more than one million residents, and four cities (New York City, Los Angeles, Chicago, and Houston) had populations exceeding two million. ^[444] Many U.S. metropolitan populations are growing rapidly, particularly in the South and West. ^[445]

American public education is operated by state and local governments and regulated by the United States American public education is operated by state and local governments and regulated by the United States Department of Education through restrictions on federal grants. In most states, children are required to attend school from the age of five or six (beginning with kindergarten or first grade) until they turn 16 (generally bringing them through twelfth grade, the end of high school), some states allow students to leave school at 16 or 17.^[449] of Americans 25 and older, 84.6% graduated from high school, 52.6% attended some college, 27.2% examed a bachelor's degree, and 9.6% earned graduate degrees. [447] The basic literacy rate is approximately 99%. [208[448]

The United States has many private and public institutions of higher education. There are local community colleges with generally more open admission policies, shorter academic programs, and lower tuttion. [449] The U.S. spends more on education per student than any nation in the world. [459] spending an average of \$12,794 per year on public elementary and secondary school students in the 2016–2017 school year. [451] As for public expenditures on higher education, the U.S. spends more per student than the OECD average, and more than all nations in combined public and private spending $^{[452]}$ Despite some student loan forgiveness programs in place, $^{[453]}$ student loan debt has increased by 102% in the last decade, $^{[454]}$ and exceeded 1.7 trillion dollars as of 2002, $^{[455]}$



The large majority of the world's top universities, as listed by various ranking organizations, are in the United States, including 19 of the top 25 [450]457][450][450]. The country has by far the most Nobel Prize winners in history, with 403 (having won 406 awards). [460]

Health

In a preliminary report, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) announced that U.S. life expectancy at birth had dropped to 76.4 years in 2021 (73.2 years for men and 79.1 years for women), down 0.9 years from 2020. This was the second year of overall decline, and the chief causes listed were the COVID-19 pandemic, accidents, drug overdoses, heart and liver disease, and suicides [462][463] [tile expectancy was highest among Asians and Hispanics and lowest among Blacks and American Indian-Alaskan Native (AIAN) peoples; 4641469] Stating in 1998, the life expectancy in the U.S. let behind that of other wealthy industriatized countries, and Americans' "health disadvantage" gap has been increasing ever since; 4690 The U.S. also has one of the highest suicide rates among high-income countries; 4691 and approximately one-third of the U.S. adult population is obese and another third is overweight; 4689 According to CDC data, mortality rates among children and adolescents increased by 20% from 2019 to 2021; 4690[470] poverty was the 4th leading cause of death for 2019, according to a 2023 study published in JAIAM, 4591.



The Texas Medical Center in downtown Houston is the largest medical complex in the world. [481]

In 2010, coronary artery disease, lung cancer, stroke, chronic obstructive pulmonary diseases, and traffic collisions caused the most years of life lost in the U.S. Low back pain, depression, musculoskeletal disorders, neck pain, and anxiety caused the most years lost to disability. The most harmful risk factors were poor diet, tobacco smoking, obesity, high blood pressure, high blood sugar, physical inactivity, and alcohol consumption. Alzheimer's disease, substance use disorders, kidney disease, cancer, and falls caused the most additional years of life lost over their age-adjusted 1990 per-capita rates [472] Teenage pregnancy and abortion rates in the U.S. are substantially higher than in other Western nations, especially among blacks and Hispanics. [473]

The U.S. health care system far outspends that of any other nation, measured both in per capita spending and as a percentage of GDP but attains worse health care outcomes when compared to peer nations. ^(1/4) The United States is the only developed nation without a system of universal health care, and a significant proportion of the population that does not carry health insurance. ^(1/4) The U.S., however, is a global leader in medical innovation, measured either in terms of revenue or the number of new drugs and devices introduced. ^(1/4) (The U.S., however, is a global leader in medical innovation, measured either in terms of revenue or the number of new drugs and devices introduced. ^(1/4) (The U.S., however, is a global leader in medical innovation, measured either in terms of revenue or the number of new drugs and devices introduced.

Nearly all present Americans or their ancestors came from Eurafrasia ("the Old World") within the past five centuries [500] Mainstream American culture is a Western culture largely derived from the traditions of European immigrants with influences from many other sources, such as traditions brought by slaves from Africa [464][501] More recent immigration from Asia and especially Latin America has added to a cultural mix that has been described as a homogenizing melting pot, and a heterogeneous salad bowl, with immigrants contributing to, and often assimilating into, mainstream American culture [464] The American Dream, or the perception that Americans enjoy high social mobility, plays a key role in attracting immigrants [500] Whether this perception is accurate has been a topic of debate, [503][4679] White Immisraream culture holds that the United States is a classiess society. Mark Twain and poet Walf Whitman were major figures in the century's second half, Emily Dickinson, virtually unknown during her lifetime, is recognized as an essential American poet. [519]

In the visual arts, the Hudson River School was a mid-19th-century movement in the tradition of European naturalism. The 1913 Armory Show in New York City, an exhibition of European modernist art, shocked the public and transformed the U.S. art scene [^{203]} Georgia O'Keeffe, Marsden Hartley, and others experimented with new, individualistic styles, within twoid become known as American modernism.

Major artistic movements such as the abstract expressionism of Jackson Pollock and Williem de Kooning and the pop at of Andy Warhol and Roy Lichtenslein developed largely in the United States. The tide of modernism and then postmodernism has brought global fame to American architects such as Frank Lloyd Wirght, Philip Johnson, and Frank Gehry, [527] Major photographers include Alfred Stleglitz, Edward Steichen, Dorothea Lange, Edward Weston, James Van Der Zee, Ansel Adams, and Gordon Paris, [529]

The most notable American architectural innovation has been the skyscraper. By some measures, what came to be known as a "skyscraper" in the modern word, first appeared in Chicago with the 1885 completion of the worlds first largely steel-frame structure, the Home Insurance Building. One culturally significant early skyscraper was New York City's Woolwords Building designed by architect Cass Gilbert. Raising previous technological advances to new heights, 793 ft (233 m), It was the world's tallest building in 1913–1930. [233]

The 21st century has been marked by the rise of American streaming platforms, such as Netflix, Disney+, Paramount+, and Apple TV+, which came to rival traditional cinema. [544]:545)

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Mainstream theater in the United States derives from the old European theatrical tradition and has been heavily influenced by the British theater. [548] The central hub of the American theater scene has been Manhattan, with its divisions of Broadway, off-Broadway, and off-off-Broadway [547] Many movie and television stars have gotten their big break working in New York productions. Outside New York City, many cities have professional regional or resident theater companies that produce their own seasons. The biggest-budget theatrical productions are musicals. U.S. theater also has an active community theater culture [548]

Music

American folk music encompasses numerous music genres, variously known as traditional music, traditional folk music, contemporary folk music, or roots music. Many traditional songs have been sung within the same family or folk group for generations, and sometimes trace back to such origins as the British Isles, Mainland Europe, or Africa [649]

The rhythmic and lyrical styles of African-American music have significantly influenced American music at large. The Smithsonian Institution states, "African-American Influences are so fundamental to American music that there would be no American music without them." (\$500) One instrument first mass-produced in the United States was the banjo, which had originally been crafted from gourds covered by animal skins by African staves. [\$611552] Banjos became widely popular in the 19th century due to their use in ministrel shows. [\$511] Country music developed in the



1920s, and rhythm and blues in the 1940s. Elements from folk idioms such as the blues and what is known as old-time music were adopted and transformed into popular genres with global audiences. Jazz was developed by innovators such as Louis Armstrong and Duke Ellington early in the 20th century. [53]

Elvis Presley and Chuck Berry were among the pioneers of rock and roll in the mid-1950s. Rock bands such as Metallica, the Eagles, and Aerosmith are among the highest grossing in worldwide sales. [584]:555]:556] in the 1960s, Bob Dylan emerged from the folk revival to become one of the country's most celebrated songwriters. [587] Mid-20th-century American pop stars such as Bing Crosby, Frank Sinatra, [589] and Elvis Presley became global celebrities. [583] as have artists of the lace 20th century such as Prince, Michael Jackson, Madonna, Whitney Houston, and Mariah Carey. [589]:569] The musical forms of punk and hijn boy both originated in the United States. [581] American professional opera singers have reached the highest level of success in that form, including Renée Fleming, Leontyne Price, Beverty Sills, Nelson Eddy, and many others. [582]

Early settlers were introduced by Native Americans to such indigenous, non-European foods as turkey, s potatoes, corn, squash, and maple syrup. They and later immigrants combined these with foods they had known, such as wheat flour, [579] beef, and milk to create a distinctive American cuisine, [580][581] Homegrown foods are part of a shared national menu on one of America's most popular holidays, Thanksgiving, when many Americans make or purchase traditional foods to celebrate the occasion. [582]

The American fast food industry, the world's first and largest, is also often viewed as being a symbol of U.S. marketing dominance. Companies such as McDonald's, ^[583] Burger King, Pizza Hut, Kentucky Fried Chicken, and Domino's Pizza among others, have numerous outlets around the world ^[584] and pioneered the drive-through format in the 1940s ^[585] Characteristic American dishes such as apple pie, fried chicken, doughnuts, french fries, maciaroni and cheese, ice cream, pizza, hamburgers, and hot dogs derive from the recipes of various immigrants ^[586] Mexican dishes such as burritos and tacos and pasta dishes freely adapted from Italian sources are widely consumed ^[586]

Basketball and ice hockey are the country's next two most popular professional team sports, with the top leagues being the National Basketball Association and the National Hockey League, which are also the premier leagues worldwide for these sports. The most-watched individual sports in the U.S. are golf and auto racing, particularly NASCAR and IndyCart. [569] On the collegiate level, earnings for the member institutions exceed 51 billion annually, [599] and coilege football and basketball attract large audiences, as the NCAA Final Four is one of the most watched national sporting events. [590]

Eight Olympic Games have taken place in the United States. The 1904 Summer Olympics in St. Louis, Missouri, were the first-ever Olympic Games held outside of Europe [1599] The Olympic Games will be held in the U.S. for a ninth time when Los Angeles hosts the 2028 Summer Oly have won a total of 2,959 medals (1,173 gold) at the Olympic Games, by far the most of any country [600][601][602]

In international soccer, the men's national soccer team qualified for eleven World Cups, while the women's national team has won the FIFA Women's World Cup and Olympic soccer tournament four times each.
